Guide to Low-Cost / No-Cost Online Tools for People with Disabilities 2005

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Introduction

The amazing advancements in technology have opened many doors for some people with disabilities and have great potential for many more. Access to emerging technologies is critical to a level playing field in the modern world. Many in traditionally underserved communities do not have this access, with people with disabilities being the most disenfranchised and least likely to have access. Common factors for this include: 1) lack of knowledge about what technology exists; 2) awareness of their rights under current education, rehabilitation and civil rights legislation; and 3) limited personal resources.

Organizations such as the Alliance for Technology Access and our partners in community technology centers are working to impact all three of these factors. The Alliance for Technology Access is a national network of Resource Members (Centers and Consultants), Associates, and Vendors working to connect people with disabilities to the tools they need. This is accomplished through demonstration, training, consulting, outreach and advocacy activities.

<u>Purpose</u>

This guide was written to provide technology resources that increase access to computers for people with disabilities. The focus here is on low-cost and no-cost on-line resources, organized by category. We believe they will be extremely useful for multiple audiences, primarily: 1) community-based organizations wanting to provide access to technology for people with disabilities; 2) individuals with disabilities or their family members; 3) service providers working with assistive technology.

The resources included here are easy to obtain and can provide options for people with disabilities. Testing these tools can give people an idea of what they can do with technology. For some people, these options will be enough to provide the access they need. For others, these tools will not be sufficient. They will need more sophisticated access tools in order to use a computer.

There are laws and funding channels designed to provide assistive technology tools and services within the education, rehabilitation, social security, and insurance systems. Many people with disabilities are eligible for services within one or more of these systems and we encourage people to check into all appropriate options.

Below are some useful information resources on how individuals can acquire technology. A few are relevant for organizations, as well.

Funding for Assistive Technology

If you need assistance finding technology for yourself or for a family member with a physical, cognitive, or sensory impairment, check out the resources listed here, and then start networking. Talk to parents through early childhood programs, school events, or advocacy groups. Find out who provides disability-related services in your community and schedule an appointment to discuss your needs. Call your local newspaper to find service organizations that may assist with purchasing adaptive equipment. Technology can enhance the quality of life of people with disabilities and improve the educational and career opportunities available. Become an advocate for yourself, a family member, or for others and search for ways to bring this technology to life.
